

They're not time wasters. They're life savers.

- · Look both ways and listen
- Obey signs
- Don't stop on a crossing
- Ensure your exit is clear before crossing
- Trains can come from both directions
- Don't rely on the timetable to assume a train is not coming
- If you see or hear a train coming, do not cross
- Never leave the gates open
- Call railway staff back, if you have been asked to do so

When crossing with a vehicle or animals consider:


- How long will it take to cross
- How heavy is your vehicle and its load
- The clearance of your vehicle, will it hit the power lines above, or will it ground
- Are animals likely to stray on the railway

How to use the crossing



Stop, look both ways and listen to check if a train is coming. If a train is coming wait in a safe place.



You must use the telephone to get permission to cross if crossing with vehicles or animals.



When you have permission to cross, open the gates on both sides of the railway.



Cross quickly and stay alert, do not stop on the crossing.



Close both gates after crossing, never leave them open.



You must telephone railway staff when you have finished crossing if they asked you to.

Pedestrians

- Stop, look both ways and listen.
- Ensure you have enough time to cross safely, cross quickly and stay alert.
- Close the gates behind you, never leave them open.
